Two roads diverged in a wood, and I-

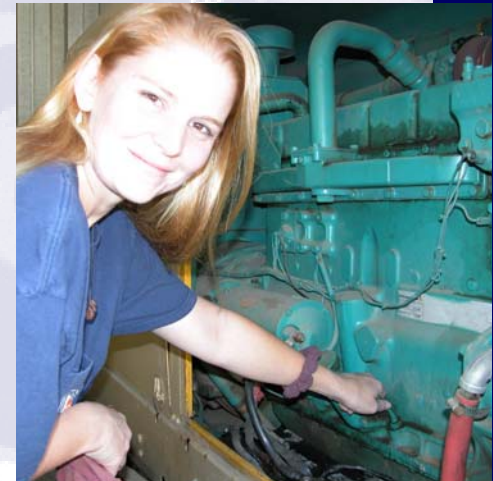
I took the one less traveled by,
